FOREWORD

CHRISTIANA SERUGOVA

AmCham Slovakia Tax Committee Chair; PwC Partner, Tax and Legal Services Leader

Taxes have a major impact on businesses, those already operating in the country but also those intending to invest in Slovakia. Hence AmCham created some years ago a special committee serving as platform for members to exchange views on taxation and provide feedback and proposals for improvement of existing taxation to the legislators.

I am proud to say that over the years, the AmCham Tax Committee has become respected body and, more importantly, the partner for negotiations with the legislators, mainly via its active participation and bringing new ideas into the process of creating the tax legislation.

Let me briefly mention just a couple of examples from the past where we were initiating the changes of legislation, such as changes to accounting penalties, followed by changes of the overall concept of tax penalties which should lead to creation of system of motivating penalties. We believe such system would lead to better tax collection and, consequently, less need for non-conceptual tax legislation changes. We also helped to introduce concepts which have been proven to work well in more developed jurisdictions, like binding rulings which after years of effort and work in putting together analysis of different systems used in different countries, were introduced into Slovak legislation in September 2014.

Currently, the AmCham Tax Committee is focused on two main issues relating to taxation which we believe are critical for the improvement of the business environment in Slovakia.

The first one is **increasing legal certainty and mutual trust between businesses and tax authorities**, which means, besides other things, having a regular plan of changes in tax and accounting legislation prepared and communicated to businesses well in advance, introducing motivating tax penalties, including the business community in the process of creation the legislation, etc.

The other one is **making Slovakia an attractive place for businesses with higher added value**. To this end, introduction of **holding legislation** would help to make Slovakia a place from where the businesses want to be headquartered. We believe that Slovakia is already extremely well positioned for this, given the existing tax legislation as well as the presence of big shared service centres, but small legislative improvements are still needed such as the introduction of a capital gains exemption that would complement the advantageous dividend taxation. In addition, taking into account the focus of the government on R&D and start-ups, we are proposing the introduction of so-called **"patent boxes"**, special tax benefits for companies engaged in R&D.

However, rapidly changing landscape of international tax system needs to be taken into account when discussing any of these changes. Our conference will, I am sure, be of great help for businesses to voice their concerns relating to coordinated actions by governments as well as unilateral measures designed by individual countries, both intended to tackle base erosion and profit shifting (BEPS) as well as for legislators to understand better the needs of businesses and the practical impact of proposed changes.
